A prolific composer with over 4,000 published works, Smith (1934-2015) not only served as a church organist, but also was editor and arranger for Lorenz Music Publishing. This piece, with its lyrical phrasing, meditative tone, and modal harmonies. invites the listener into a quiet space of supplication and trust.

Luke 11:1-13

He was praying in a certain place, and after he had finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray, as John taught his disciples." He said to them, "When you pray, say:

Father, hallowed be your name.

Your kingdom come.

Give us each day our daily bread.

And forgive us our sins,

for we ourselves forgive everyone indebted to us. And do not bring us to the time of trial."

And he said to them, "Suppose one of you has a friend, and you go to him at midnight and say to him, 'Friend, lend me three loaves of bread; for a friend of mine has arrived, and I have nothing to set before him.' And he answers from within, 'Do not bother me; the door has already been locked, and my children are with me in bed; I cannot get up and give you anything.' I tell you, even though he will not get up and give him anything because he is his friend, at least because of his persistence he will get up and give him whatever he needs.

"So I say to you, Ask, and it will be given you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you. For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened. Is there anyone among you who, if your child asks for a fish, will give a snake instead of a fish? Or if the child asks for an egg, will give a scorpion? If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!"

Composed by J. S. Bach in 1723 as part of his Cantata No. 147, the beloved chorale "Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring" appears twice in the work most famously as its concluding movement, Jesus bleibet meine Freude. Though the melody was originally penned by Johann Schop in the 17th century, Bach's harmonization, orchestration, and rhythmic treatment transformed it into a timeless piece of sacred joy. Its gentle rhythm and flowing triplets evoke a serene devotion that transcends centuries.

PRAYER CONCERNS

The tender piano setting by Clarence Kohlman (1891–1944) of the old hymn, "Sweet Hour of Prayer," invites the listener into a quiet sanctuary of devotion. Published in 1942, it reflects Kohlman's gift for weaving sacred melody with expressive nuance. Resident organist for 20 years at the Great Auditorium organ in Ocean Grove, NJ, Kohlman brought warmth and drama to his arrangements here, the familiar hvmn becomes a gentle meditation, echoing the soul's longing for communion and peace.

"Thy Kingdom Come," a majestic and stately organ postlude written in 1998 by Will Stockton, offers a noble reflection on the hope and promise of Christ's reign. Though little is known about the composer, his work—published in the 1990s and early 2000s continues to be played in churches of all denominations across the country and around the world. Three of Stockton's mostplayed pieces include "Fanfare on EASTER HYMN," "Softly and Tenderly," And "Postlude on MILES LANE" (All Hail the Power of Jesus'

Name).

Pastors' Note

The Lord's prayer appears in both the Gospel of Matthew (6:9-13) and the Gospel of Luke (11:1-4). The prayer recorded in Matthew is the longer of the two versions, and it is the one that we Presbyterians, along with many other Christians, customarily recite both privately and in public worship.

You might find it interesting to know that, in the original Greek, both Matthew and Luke are using a form of the word "ὀφειλήματα [opheilēmata]," which refers to a debt owed to another. Why then, do some faith traditions still pray for the forgiveness of "trespasses?" Even the King James Version of the Bible, published in 1611, translated the word as "debt."

There are many explanations (history, custom, theological interpretation) for the difference, but Bible scholars point out that, as recorded in Matthew, Jesus follows his teaching of what we call the Lord's Prayer with the explanation, "For if you forgive others their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you; but if you do not forgive others, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses" (6:14). Here, Matthew is using the Greek word "παραπτώματα [paraptōmata]," which means "trespasses" (or "transgressions").

Whether we ask God to forgive our debts or our trespasses as we likewise forgive others, your pastor believes that Jesus was teaching us to ask God to forgive us all our sins against God and neighbor and to forgive our neighbor's sins in the same way we pray that God forgives ours. The next time you pray for the forgiveness of your debts or your trespasses, silently consider the word "sins" in your mind. That way, you never have to worry about the "correct" translation!
